CPE Reflection: Spring 22 Units for Ecumenical Institute

What do CPE students accomplish as they do clinical (ministry) hours? I reflected on the recently ended units offered through Ecumenical Institute. There were twelve students in two groups. These people served in hospital, hospice, home health, parish, mental health, military, and community-based settings.

They were scattered across Iowa, South Dakota, and Minnesota.

From September 2021 to March 2022, these students each gave at least 300 hours of ministry. As I write these things come to mind...

Chaplains and pastors sitting with family members with a loved one dying from Covid19

Listening to a young Native American in a mental health unit struggle to find hope.

Regularly visiting an elderly parishioner who is alone.

Serving as a National Guard chaplain call to deployment over Christmas Just being with a young father who child died unexpectedly.

Hearing the stories of abuse and violence in homes.

Preaching for renewal and change in a parish

Hearing the confession of a doctor losing his career due to addiction Bring communion to a long-term parishioner who is nursing home bound Taking time to know the often-overlooked hospital custodial worker.

Making time for a colleague to support a seriously ill son
Sharing with colleagues our own fears, frustration, and bewilderment
Hearing the story of a man losing his marriage and business and attempting suicide
Sitting on the church step and listening to an angry, delusional person
Attending to the dialysis patient who sits alone for long periods of treatment.

Helping families manage their dysfunction and loss in times of grief.

Holding sacred space for a person's last moment of life

Supporting exhausted nurses and hospital staff.

Supporting a young child as her just a few years older brother has died.

Sharing with a person about mysticism and listening to the stories never told.

Giving presence to people of other traditions so they may find comfort

Offering prayers of spontaneous nature and prayers from prayer books

A definition of pastoral care goes like this:

Pastoral Care is learning the language of fear, pain, frustration, anger, and bitterness so as to walk with a person through the twisted valley of the shadow communicating, 'I am with you.'

These twelve students did all of that and more during this unit. I am pleased to have learned and worked with each of them. They will say, as does the Biblical text, 'We are only doing what is expected of us."

But we can say, "Thanks be to God" for chaplains and pastors like these!
